


Three phases of prepping for trial







COMMUNICATION

INVESTIGATION

PREPARATION

- Three substantive meetings with your client:
- 1.) Introduction: you to each other, to the case, to the process
- 2.) Discovery review: in depth look at the case, the evidence and what you need to find out.
- 3.) Resolution discussion: Trial? Plea? Alternative resolution?

Introduction:

- Focus on where you are in the system:
- Major Felony offense: What it means to be charged with a felony, the specific RCW and elements, the collateral consequences, the sentencing ranges
- Review the general facts (usually the PC) emphasize you will be going into more detail later
- What are the options for resolution: Trial, Plea or an alternative resolution.
- I always say: I prepare every case with the plan that it is going to trial. This helps us both be as prepared as possible and to negotiate from a position of strength.

Discovery review

- Focus on:
- inconsistency wit the states case/theory
- What you can't change
- Where can you look for additional information

- Resolution Discussion:
- Trial: it can be win it all or lose it all, but this our default position
- Plea: only plea if there is a reason to do so
- Alternatives: Is the juice worth the squeeze?

- 2) Interview witnesses
- 3) Find what's missing

- Interview Witnesses
- -All about what they will say, and how they say it
- Avoid: gotcha moments
- In person important: Alleged victims, heavily involved investigators, major experts

What's missing? **Experts** Alibi Eyewitnesses

Prepare with a purpose

Have motions in limine and joint trial management reports (at least your part) prepared by readiness

2

Have your opening, direct questions and a cross outline prepared the week before trial

3

Jury instructions and closing as you go!


Red=client meetings Blue=Investigation Green=Preparations

- 8.) Prepare motions in limine, and joint trial management reports
- 9.) Trial Readiness
- 10.) Prepare opening, directs, outline of cross
- 11.) Trial!!

Sample 60-Day Schedule

- January 2, 2023: Case assigned
- January 3rd or 4th: Introduction meeting- 1 hour
- January 11th: Arraignment
- January 25th: Review Discovery-2 hours
- January 26th or 27th: Discovery review meeting-2 hours
- January 30th: Prepare case theory-theory/theme-1 hour
- February 1st-10th: Interview witnesses-Find what's missing 1-2 hours per interview
- February 10th: Resolution discussion- 1 hour
- February 10th: Prepare motions in limine, and joint trial management reports-2 hours
- February 13th: Trial Readiness
- March 3rd: Prepare opening, directs, outline of cross-3 hours
- March 13th: Trial!!
